### **GUILFORD HOSTS EMORY & HENRY IN SEASON FINALE**

Saturday, Nov. 10, 2007 - 1:00 p.m. - Appenzeller Field, Armfield Athletic Center, (Greensboro, N.C.)

**THE GUILFORD-EMORY & HENRY SERIES:** Guilford and Emory & Henry meet for the 59th time today in the Quakers' third most-played rivalry. The Wasps have won four of the past five contests against Guilford and eight of the last 10. While the Wasps hold a 33-25 edge in the season series, the Quakers have more wins against Emory & Henry than any other opponent.

**Todd Woods** threw a touchdown pass to Gavin Haynes with four seconds remaining as the Wasps rallied for a 27-23 victory in Emory, Va. Woods threw two touchdowns and **Matt Gillespie** gained 182 rushing yards for the Wasps. Guilford's **Josh Vogelbach** threw for 298 yards and two touchdowns.

**EMORY & HENRY HEAD COACH DON MONTGOMERY:** **Don Montgomery** wraps up his third season as Emory & Henry's grid boss this afternoon. He has an 11-18 record as the Wasps' head coach and guided the team to a second-place ODAC finish in 2006. **Montgomery** is 6-11 in 17 ODAC contests.

Before coming to Emory & Henry, Montgomery was the defensive coordinator at Mount Union College in Alliance, Ohio. Over 27 years there, Montgomery built an impressive resume that included offensive line coach, defensive line coach, inside-linebacker coach, and 19 years as defensive coordinator. His defensive units consistently ranked among the best in NCAA Division III and the Purple Raiders won seven national titles in his time.

Montgomery graduated from Mount Union in 1977. He was an all-conference offensive lineman and team captain for the Purple Raiders.

### **GUILFORD DOWNS CATHOLIC, 34-27, FOR FIRST ODAC WIN**

**LAST GAME:** **Markas Brunson** returned a blocked field goal 88 yards for a touchdown with 1:24 left to help visiting Guilford past Catholic last Saturday, 34-27. Brunson also forced a Catholic fumble on the Quakers' two-yard line with 36 seconds left, which teammate **Danny Langston** recovered to preserve Guilford's lead.

Guilford opened a 28-14 fourth-quarter lead after **Josh Vogelbach's** second touchdown pass of the game, a 30-yard scoring strike to **Kevin Vaughn**. The Cardinals rallied behind the fourth-quarter passing of Kevin Ricca, who pulled Catholic to within 28-27 with 4:32 left.

Moments later, Catholic had first and goal from Guilford's two-yard line, but failed to punch it in. Brendan Deluca, who earlier missed a point-after attempt and had a 24-yard field goal blocked, lined up for an 18-yard field goal with 1:40 left, but Guilford's **Jackson Williams** surged through the middle of the line and blocked the kick that Brunson recovered and carried 88 yards for a 34-27 Guilford lead.

Vogelbach overcame two first-half interceptions and finished with 367 passing yards and two touchdowns. He became the 18<sup>th</sup> football student-athlete in NCAA Division III history to pass the 10,000 career passing yards mark with a second-quarter completion to **Joe Joyner**. **Hagen Miller** caught 11 passes for 32 yards and Joyner added 10 grabs for 110 yards.

**UNDER THE LIGHTS:** Guilford played the first night game on its campus in the school's 101-season history Sept. 15 against Averett University. A year after dedicating a three-story press box and renaming the game field at the Armfield Athletic Center, Guilford debuted new field lights and visitors bleachers, installed last spring. The latest additions to **Dr. Herbert T. Appenzeller** Field and the Armfield Athletic Center mark the second of three phases of renovations to the home of Guilford's football and lacrosse teams. The first phase, completed in August 2006, included the press box, dedicated in honor of **Edward M. Armfield, Sr.** Mr. Armfield is the son of **William J. Armfield, II**, a student on Guilford College's first football team, and one of three members of the family for whom the stadium is named. Edward Armfield's foundation provided a substantial gift towards the \$1.15-million phase-one project that also included a new scoreboard, 176 permanent seats, rest rooms and other aesthetic upgrades.

Fund-raising continues for the project's third phase, which includes an artificial playing surface, an improved entry plaza and gate and other landscaping enhancements.

**BRUNSON HONORED:** Sophomore **Markas Brunson** won the weekly Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC) Defensive Football Player of the Week Award Nov. 4. He is Guilford's first recipient of the weekly defensive prize this season. **Brunson** also picked up Guilford's Student-Athlete of the Week prize, presented by Guilford's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC). D3Football.com and Don Hansen's *Football Gazette* tabbed him for their NCAA Division III national Team of the Week.

**Brunson** made a couple of big plays down the stretch to help Guilford snap a three-game losing streak in a 34-27 victory over Catholic University Nov. 3. He recovered a blocked field goal with 1:24 left in the game and returned it 88 yards for a touchdown, providing the final margin in the win. The 5-10, 225-pound linebacker also forced a Catholic fumble on the Quakers' goal line with 36 seconds left in regulation to ensure the conference victory. **Brunson** made a game- and career-high 13 tackles (9 solo), including a sack.

**VOGELBACH LANDS TWO WEEKLY ODAC PRIZES:** Redshirt-junior quarterback **Josh Vogelbach** won the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC) Offensive Player of the Week Award Sept. 16, which marked the second time this season and the sixth time in his career he has received the honor. Vogelbach completed 28-of-37 passes for 360 yards and seven touchdowns in the Quakers' Sept. 15 win over Averett University. He broke the ODAC's career pass completions mark in the game and had the third-highest completion percentage (75.7%) in school history.

In earning his first weekly award of 2007, Vogelbach passed for an ODAC- and Guilford-record eight touchdowns the Sept. 1 70-26 victory at Southern Virginia University. He threw five touchdowns and three two-point conversions in Guilford's 38-point second quarter. Vogelbach completed 77.1 percent (27-35) of his passes in the win, the second-highest completion percentage in school history.

Through 29 college games, Vogelbach has thrown for over 400 yards nine times and for over 300 yards 19 times.

**HEAD COACH KEVIN KIESEL:** **Kevin Kiesel** (KEE-sul) took over for **Mike Ketchum '78** in March 2005. Ketchum moved into an administrative role in Guilford's athletic department the preceding December before resigning soon thereafter to become the defensive coordinator at Division II Winston-Salem State.

Kiesel owns an 80-72-1 record in 14-plus seasons as a head coach, 16-13 in two-plus years at Guilford. He ranks fifth among Guilford's all-time coaching victories leaders. Before joining the Quakers, he spent four years at Division II Millersville University after building non-scholarship winners at Division I-AA Fairfield University (1996-2000) and Division III Albright College (1993-95). He inherited an 0-10 team at Albright and moved on

three years later after the Lions went 8-3 and won the 1995 ECAC Southwest title game. Kiesel started Fairfield's program from scratch in 1996 and went 24-6 in his final three years. Kiesel, a Pennsylvania native, is a 1981 Gettysburg College graduate and has made assistant-coaching stops at the U.S. Naval Academy, the University of Kentucky, Fordham University, Temple University, West Chester (Pa.) University and Gettysburg.

**RECORDS WATCH:** Guilford's offensive explosion this year has impacted both the school and ODAC record books. Through eight games, the Quakers have set 10 school records and 13 league marks. The new records are as follows:

**Other Notable Milestones**

Redshirt-sophomore receiver **Hagen Miller** ranks third on Guilford's single-season list with 92 receptions this year. The school record of 101 is held by student assistant coach **Chris Barnette '08**. Miller's 842 receiving yards stand ninth in school history 22 yards out of eighth place.

**Vogelbach** ranks 11th on the NCAA Division III career passing touchdowns list with 103. He needs six scoring strikes to move into 10th place and his 10,197 yards stand 16th among Division III's career leaders. Last week he became NCAA Division III's 18th member of the 10,000-passing yard club. His Division III season-high 592 passing yards versus Hampden-Sydney Sept. 22 ranks sixth in NCAA Division III history.

Sophomore place-kicker **Hunter Chappell** ranks fifth in school history with 30 successful point after attempts. **Travis Frazier** set the school record of 33 in 2005. Chappell backed up Frazier in 2006, but did not appear in any games.

Senior **Joe Joyner** (195) needs seven catches to pass **Junior Lord** for third place on Guilford's career catches list. Joyner caught the 30th touchdown pass of his career Oct. 27, which ranks second in school history, three shy of **Lord's** record of 33. The senior ranks fourth on the school's career touchdowns chart (30), one score behind **Chris Barnette '08**. Joyner's 15 touchdown catches this year rank second in school history, two shy of Lord's standard of 17 set in 1997.

Senior **Mario Paylor's** 14.5 career sacks stand fourth all-time at Guilford. One-and-a-half more will place him in a tie for third with former teammate **Delvin Newkirk '05**.

**QUAKERS PICKED THIRD IN THE ODAC:** Guilford received its highest preseason rating according to the league's head football coaches since 1998. Tabbed third in the league, the Quakers trailed Bridgewater College, winners of five of the past six Old Dominion Athletic Conference titles, and defending league champion Washington and Lee University. Emory & Henry College follows the Quakers in fourth place, followed by Hampden-Sydney College, Catholic University of America and Randolph-Macon College. Guilford last won the ODAC title in 1997 when it shared the honor with Randolph-Macon and Emory & Henry. The Quakers won their second league crown outright in 1991, their first year of membership.

**DID YOU KNOW:** Junior receiver **Jon McKinney**, who caught a 25-yard touchdown at Bridgewater for his first college reception, was a competitive surfer and wakeboarder before coming to Guilford in 2006... redshirt-senior linebacker **Mario Paylor** captained his 2001 Northern Durham High School team that included future NFL draft picks A.J. Davis and Josh Gattis... sophomore defensive lineman **David Madorin** has spent 14 years in a competitive bowling league and owns a 210 scoring average... senior running back **Troy Smith's** older brother, **Josh '03**, was Guilford's starting quarterback in 2001 and 2002... freshman offensive lineman **A.J. Harbour** is 21 years old and earned his associates degree in applied science before coming to Guilford... sophomore linebacker **Richie Paul** and junior receiver **Anthony Dubek-Trolio** were high school teammates of **Josh Vogelbach**. Paul played on the national champion Senior Cypress Lake Hornets Pop Warner football team in 1999. Dubek-Trolio won two gold medals at the 1997 national junior in-line speed skating championships.

**GUILFORD ON THE AIR AND ON THE INTERNET:** For the 13th consecutive season, veteran play-by-play man **Tom Bryant '80** calls all of Guilford's football action with color commentator **Miles Poole** and sideline reporter **Bob Mayton**. Guilford's Coordinator of Sports Marketing, **Bryan Jones**, joins the 2007 broadcast team as host and producer.
