## Reception Will Salute Faculty Icons Deagon, Maynard, Moore, Zopf

Guilford continues its tradition of honoring retired faculty members during Homecoming Weekend by recognizing Ann Fleming Deagon, **Stuart T. Maynard '43**, J. Floyd "Pete" Moore '39 and Paul E. Zopf Jr. this year.

■ Deagon earned her doctorate in classics from UNC Chapel Hill and served as Hege Professor of Humanities and writer-in-residence at Guilford from 1956-92. She was editor of *The Guilford Review*, director of Poetry Center Southeast, and was instrumental in establishing the North Carolina Writers' Network. While performing in theatre, film and songwriting, she continues to present readings and workshops in creative writing and

mythology and critiques for NCWN. A creative writing fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts is among numerous awards Deagon has received.

■ Maynard played football at Guilford, and after a tour of duty in the U.S. Navy, returned to his alma mater in 1951 to serve as athletic director, head football and baseball coach and associate professor of physical education. Under his direction, the Quakers' baseball team won 436 games, ranked fourth in the nation in 1966 and finished seventh at the 1976 NAIA World Series. He coached three All-Americans and 11 student-athletes who signed professional baseball con-

tracts. Maynard was a member of the inaugural class of the Guilford Athletic Hall of Fame in 1970 and was enshrined in the NAIA Hall of Fame in 1982, the same year he received the Alumni Excellence Award.

■ Moore was a fixture at the college from 1944-84 as professor of Biblical literature and religious studies, and at the same time shouldered a variety of roles both on campus and off. He holds a doctorate from Boston University and served as a correspondent for the *Greensboro Daily News*, spent two years as the college's director of public relations, worked in admission and for the Alumni Association, and was secretary for the Fourth World Conference of Friends, which Guilford hosted in 1967.

■ Zopf, Dana professor of sociology and anthropology emeritus, became a member of the sociology department in 1959. It is estimated that he taught 5,000 of the 10,000 students who graduated from the college during his tenure. Zopf was elected by the student body to give the 1977 commencement address and won the Excellence in Teaching Award in 1978. He has served as college marshal in recent years.

## Guadalajara Program, Intercolonias Mark Milestones

A special celebration is planned for Homecoming Weekend to commemorate the 20th anniversary of Intercolonias and the Guadalajara study abroad program. Intercolonias members will be on campus to join program alumni in recognition of our relationships and celebration for future work. Alumni are invited to share the significance of the program in their lives and work.

Intercolonias, a Mexican social justice organization founded on the teachings of Paulo Freire, has been working to transform local realities since its founding in 1985. Working with approximately 30 colonias in Guadalajara, the group's beneficiaries include a youth sports league, a credit union, and an ongoing political dialogue of current issues and their cultural interchange with Guilford. Carol Clark, retired professor of economics, conceived and launched the collaboration with Intercolonias some two decades ago.

Participating Guilford students study at a branch of the Universidad de Guadalajara, work with Intercolonias and live with a host family. "Intercolonias is a partnership in which communities work

together and learn from one another," says Claire Morse, a professor of psychology and former leader of the program. "It's an exchange between equal partners – and we experience this in Guadalajara."

To facilitate this process, participants enroll in a semester-long community development course which "brings the richness of Guilford College to Mexico," according to **Blaine Lukkar '00**, who served as resident director of the program for two years. "The Quaker process of consensus and intense, all-inclusive communication complements the community work in which students engage."

The Bonner Scholars Program, which has been active at Guilford since 1991, provides monetary support to students who have demonstrated financial need and commitment to community service. with others who share their commitment to service, both on campus and in the wider Bonner network (which is active at 25 schools nationwide and funded by the

And with Guilford's tradition of service and activism (students volunteer approximately 50,000 hours in the Greensboro community each year), the program is much more than just a form of financial aid.
